# GREEN AMBASSADORS ADVOCATE FOR IMPROVEMENTS

From knocking on doors to reporting potholes, Green Ambassadors are residents of Lindsay Heights that advocate for neighborhood improvements and safety. Funded by the Greater Milwaukee Foundation, Walnut Way hired two ambassadors to pilot the program.

"Being a Green Ambassador is helping me gain a ground-level perspective about what needs attention in the community," said Ed Wingard, Green Ambassador.

Ambassadors connect neighbors to community events, maintain neighborhood safety and cleanliness and give Eco Tours highlighting "green" sites.

# NEIGHBOR NIGHT MINDFUL EATING & NUTRITION SERIES

This year we forged new partnerships to strengthen our programming. Thanks to support from American Cancer Society, we offered robust year-round cooking and nutrition classes centered around mindfulness. Classes were taught by author and nutritionist Bridgett Wilder, and caterer, Chef Anomalous Campbell.

Over the course of the program, we reached hundreds of participants and created spaces for connectedness, multigenerational connections, healthy food conversations and goal planning. Bridgett Wilder will continue to support individuals on their wellness journeys, as a tenant in Phase II of the Innovations and Wellness Commons.

# MY STORY BY CHEF ANOMALOUS CAMPBELL

#### **HOW IT BEGAN**

I hit a rough patch in my life so a friend invited me to Core EL Centro for an affordable program for our children to play. While waiting, I saw a flyer for the Growing Healthy Soil (GHS) gardening workshops at Walnut Way. I ended up taking the free class and through the program, I learned that there were extremely high lead levels in my backyard soil. I had my daughter's lead levels checked and found out she tested 7 mcg/dL, on the lead scale, where 5 was

considered very serious and requires action. Walnut Way and everyone included at Walnut Way immediately wrapped their arms around me and my family. All of these interesting people sparked a flame in my life, like Angela Smith, the Healing Circle Facilitator; Antonio Butts, the Executive Director; Nate Gilliam, the GHS Coordinator; and an array of other beautiful people. Jeremy, the Environmental Stewardship Specialist, came and installed a new garden bed in my backyard. It was one of the most beautiful experiences of my life. Gardening has offered my family food, tranquility, and togetherness.

#### PRIOR TO WALNUT WAY

At the time, I was working for MPS as a janitor for 14.5 years. When I found out about the soil and lead levels in my daughter, I wanted to be a stay at home mom. I didn't understand why people my color couldn't be at home with their children and why I had to work so hard and have other people raise her. Fast forward, Angela, asked me to cook for a group that meets at Walnut Way called The Healing Circle for Women. I cooked for her...and this person liked it and that person liked it...and it spread throughout the community. It was amazing.

#### WHERE I AM NOW

Through my collaboration with Walnut Way I've had the opportunity to become a full time entrepreneur. Full time entrepreneurship has allowed me to be a healthier, happier mother full time. I have a wonderful support team and have now catered for American Cancer Society, Medical College of Wisconsin, City of Milwaukee, Housing Authority, Metcalfe Park Community Bridges, Alices Garden, Fresh Empire Milwaukee, Pearls for Girls, America's Black Holocaust Museum and all sorts of other events offered at Walnut Way. I now have my own catering company called Anomaly Catering and I owe it all to programs offered at Walnut Way. Thank you to my community and everyone involved.



# BLUE SKIES LANDSCAPING LEADS WITH GREEN INFRASTRUCTURE

Walnut Way's Blue Skies Landscaping is growing and building capacity. Since 2012, we have increased the skills and certifications of our workforce, which allows us to take on bigger and more complex projects.

With the City of Milwaukee's Environmental Collaboration Office, BSL launched a series of green infrastructure and clean energy projects, including our first solar installations. In addition, Lindsay Heights earned The City of Milwaukee's first "Eco-Tour" neighborhood designation. Funding was awarded by the national Institute for Sustainable Communities, to help make our community more climate resilient.

At the Sherman Phoenix, a community-owned marketplace, BSL is giving the entry plaza a big boost. With designs from New Eden Landscape Design, BSL is replacing the asphalt eye-sore with a green oasis featuring a raingarden, bioswale and permeable pavers to capture water. Customers will also enjoy outdoor seating, planters, and lighting for evening use.



#### PROTECTING OUR WATER

During heavy rainstorms, polluted stormwater overflows into Lake Michigan from Milwaukee's combined sewer system. That's why protecting our freshwater is an important conservation and job sustaining effort for Blue Skies Landscaping. In the landscape, BSL replaces cement with permeable pavement and builds bioswales and rain gardens using native plants with deep root systems to absorb stormwater, thereby reducing the impact on our sewer system.



Walnut Way maintains over 60 fruit trees on our campus where vacant lots once stood. Our cherries, peaches, pears, apples, and even plums make their way across the city in the form of canned preserves and fruit baskets sold at the Fondy Farmers Market and at local restaurants.





# INTERNS DEVELOP A DIVERSE SKILLSET IN AGRICULTURE

Stacy Whiters, pictured center, returned for his second year as a Growing Youth Leadership Intern. The program is a first job for many teens where they dedicate their summer to hard work in the fields yielding abundant harvests. This season, Whiters developed his skills in a variety of urban agriculture methods like aquaponics, green-house growing, preservation, and making compost to enrich the gardens.



# NEIGHBORHOOD SPIRIT BRINGS COMMUNITY WEALTH BUILDING

As economic growth from downtown reaches into our community, we want to make sure our current residents are prepared to benefit. This year, we implemented the Community Wealth Building Campaign Program with residents interested in economic development. The program increased awareness of alternative economic development strategies such as cultivating neighborhood assets, growing resident ownership and control, and collaboration with anchor institutions.

26 residents were interviewed by five neighborhood connectors who captured the skills, interests and desires related to their economic life. As a result, neighbors are:

- Starting new employment
- Winning job bids for their home and landscape businesses
- Selling food, products and services at the Fondy Farmers Market
- Creating a support group for food entrepreneurs

Most importantly, neighbors were able to build relationships that stimulate economic growth.



# THE ART OF COMMUNITY CREATES ABUNDANCE AT HARVEST DAY

Our 19th Annual Harvest Day festival truly demonstrated this year's theme, the Art of Community. Together, we celebrated the abundance that working collectively creates. In partnership with Fondy Food Center, Harvest Day was held at Fondy Park and Market, which was fully bloomed and buzzing with activity!

Vibrant music from local bands was heard across the market. Crowds gathered in amazement as The Milwaukee Flyers tumbling team flew through the sky. Hot and spicy food aromas filled the air from local vendors like That Salsa Lady who sources her ingredients from the Walnut Way gardens whenever possible.

ArtWorks for Milwaukee unveiled their latest inspiring mural which was created by teens that interned at Walnut Way this summer. The Kids Zone was fluttering with STEAM activities and butterfly face paintings thanks to support from residents, MSOE, Kohl's Color Wheels, and sponsor 88NINE Radio Milwaukee.

Even the bees were buzzing as they enjoyed the park's flowering raingarden. We anticipate another fruitful Harvest Day next year, as we gear up for our 20th anniversary!

# MY STORY: BY EMONIA BARNETT

EMONIA REFLECTS ON HER ROLE AS A "NEIGHBORHOOD CONNECTOR" AND "WARRIOR AND UPLIFTER" IN LINDSAY HEIGHTS

I moved back to Milwaukee to be caregiver for my father who had lived in Lindsay Heights 30+ years. He loved the community and knew many of the people who lived here; he was especially concerned for the children.

I did not feel the same about the community until I started walking, meeting and talking with the neighbors. This led me from calling Lindsay Heights "THE community" to "MY community." I met other liked-minded people in the neighborhood. As a group, we walked our community meeting neighbors, listening to the history, concerns and the love people have for Lindsay Heights. Our walks lead to the formation of a supportive community group that focuses on "good 53206 neighbors," effective neighborhood activities and research to assist with improving neighbor's lives and homes. Our group is called Warriors & Uplifters of 53206.

This involvement lead me to the pilot program at Walnut Way, Community Wealth Building Campaign (CWBC), an amazing and potentially life changing initiative. Economic development is an important aspect of any community and our community in particular. CWB, asset-based focus offers an alternative and innovative approach to economic development, growth, cooperation and collaboration. I LOVE IT! In the program, I am a Neighborhood Connector where I had the chance to interview residents about their skills, talents, and interests. I love being involved with the talented, enthusiastic, risk-taking people who're moving toward meeting their goals for themselves and Lindsay Heights.

# **ARTWORKS FOR MILWAUKEE**

Our partnership continues to flourish with ArtWorks for Milwaukee. In 2019, ArtWorks coordinated two art based internship programs at Walnut Way with Milwaukee teens. Two murals were completed and installed on the Walnut Way campus and at nearby **Sunshine Park**, a recently revitalized City of Milwaukee Home Gr/OWN owned vacant lot on 14th and North Avenue. Our Blue Skies Landscaping team installed the park.

The murals convey themes of unity, respect, and safety. The interns gathered input from the community through surveys and by speaking to neighbors.

ArtWorks for Milwaukee is a local non-profit for teens that integrates 21st Century life skills training with community art making. In 2006, ArtWorks created the iconic Caring Neighbors Mural, located adjacent to Walnut Way's gardens in the alleyway. In 2018, a team of professional and teen artists restored the caring neighbors mural to its orginal vibrancy.




