Why we exist

The WEBB is a Wisconsin coalition organized around environmental justice, clean energy, and community power.

We carry the work forward through resident leadership, statewide alignment, and a shared commitment to a just clean economy.

Grounded in place

Milwaukee, Madison, Metcalfe Park, tribal lands, and communities across the state.

Directed by residents

The people closest to the harm are the ones directing the work.

Built for the long arc

Policy, capital, and coalition capacity that outlast any one cycle.

Clarity of purpose

We are not a working group. We are a coalition of coalitions with a shared floor and a shared ask.

Our purpose is to align Wisconsin's environmental justice, clean energy, and community capacity work so that when candidates and decision-makers ask what the movement wants, there is one clear answer, backed by the people who live it.

Alignment. Critical mass. One ask.

The arc

From EJII to WEBB. From a single rate case to a coalition of coalitions.

2022

EJII — where we started

Environmental Justice and Infrastructure Initiative. Regulatory work at the PSC. Grassroots capacity-building on strategic funding. IRA moment on the horizon promising implementation — opportunities that were never realized. We stayed the course and built the foundation.

Broadening

The tent widens

The first rate case taught us we needed both a regulatory spine and an implementation stream. We broadened into WEBB — Wisconsin Eco Justice Base Builders — a coalition of coalitions that could hold both.

Today

What we hold

Regulatory spine: energy affordability, PSC representation, capacity for smaller organizations to engage. Implementation stream: community-owned renewable infrastructure, McKnight-funded. Wins in cases. Others brought along. Visibility.

Going

The closing arc

Rate case hearing ≈ Sept 1. Election in November. Re-grants closing out. Funder renewal in process. CC nominations before Oct 31 for the next service period. HUD funding held today for Healthy Homes Level 1 programming and community-owned renewable infrastructure delivery.

The arc is coalition to coalition. From a single case at the PSC to the tent that holds both the regulatory spine and the implementation stream.

Move from alignment to public commitments from candidates and decision-makers.

The scorecard

For the 2026 Wisconsin gubernatorial election.

Vote With Wisdom 2026 — a nonpartisan candidate scorecard. Primary in August 2026. General in November 2026. Term begins January 2027.

WHAT

A nonpartisan candidate scorecard. 15 questions across 6 issue areas: Energy and Utility Justice, Affordability, Housing and Community Ownership, Workforce, Health and Environment, Governance. Same questions, same deadline, same publication terms for every certified gubernatorial candidate. Published in the open at walnutway.org.

WHEN

Circulated to all certified 2026 gubernatorial candidates ahead of the primary. Responses published as they come in. Read alongside the Milwaukee north-side forum and community briefings this fall. Commitments carried into the 2027 term.

WHY

So the questions our communities are already carrying — utility bills, housing costs, healthy homes, jobs, civic power — sit on the record. So voters and organizers work from a shared reference. So candidates cannot walk past these issues once elected. Community-inside frame in the record, not around it.

9 Yes/No commitment questions. 6 short-answer policy questions.

What we heard

Convergence on ratepayer protection and data center accountability.

Every scorecard responder answered YES to Q1 (big users pay their own way), Q3 (cap energy burden), Q13 (100% clean standard), and Q14 (data center accountability).

On data center accountability — the June 27 forum, in their own words:

"If a community doesn't want a data center, then the data center shouldn't be built."

The rate case — how we got here

Four cases across four years. Data center tariff, legislative law, and the Oracle judicial review now converge on the current case.

The arc of the cases

2022

Docket 5-UR-110. Walnut Way's first-time intervention. The first Black-led community organization from Milwaukee to legally intervene in a WEPCO rate case in the PSC's hundred-year history. LIFT program preserved. Return on equity brought down to 9.8 percent.

2023

5-UR-110 reopener for the 2024 test year. Coalition sharpened. Energy-burden testimony refined.

2024-25

5-UR-111 for the 2025 and 2026 test years. Push for mandatory energy-burden analyses; LIFT amortization; safeguards against ratepayer-funded legal spending.

2025-26

6630-TE-113. The data center tariff — Very Large Customer and Bespoke Resources. Walnut Way earned standing. Intervenor Compensation of \$154,407.50 awarded. April 24, 2026 preliminary PSC decision rejected the worst of the cost-shift onto residential customers.

The current case — what is converging

5-UR-112 — the 2027-28 case

Walnut Way accepted as intervenor on June 3, 2026. Intervenor testimony due August 10. Reply briefs October 2. Public hearing window ahead. PSC final decision late 2026. New rates take effect January 2027 — the same month a new governor takes office.

The data center tariff

6630-TE-113 does not close cleanly. The VLC and Bespoke tariffs from that case now roll into 5-UR-112 as cost-allocation questions. Hyperscale demand pushes capital spend that residential customers are being asked to underwrite.

Legislative law converging

State-level moves on data center siting, credit standards, and tariff authority run parallel to the docket. What the Legislature signals in 2026 shapes what the PSC can hold in 2027.

Oracle — Ozaukee County judicial review

Oracle America Cloud Services filed suit in Ozaukee County Circuit Court to challenge the PSC's Very Large Customer tariff and credit-rating rules from 6630-TE-113. PSC will defend in court. Clean Wisconsin filed a statement of position asking the court to affirm. The tariff is now a courtroom question as well as a docket question.

Comment campaign partner. Walk-in support for filing on the record.

Milwaukee Community Land Trust — site TBD

Potential office site for volunteer-led comment tables. Confirmation pending.

Walnut Way Conservation Corp

On-site comment location. Coalition backbone and staff support.

How we get the word out, August through November

Radio campaign, paid

WNOV, 98.3, and other Milwaukee stations. August through November.

Non-commercial radio interviews

Two or three on-air interviews on WUWM, Riverwest Radio, or WYMS. Rate case, data center, and voter education explained plainly.

Social and paid media

Coordinated posts and boosted content across Meta, Instagram, and TikTok. Aligned with grantee and CC networks.

Paid neighbor canvassers

Who can do it: 18 and up. Rate case, GOTV, and voter education carried by residents on the same doors.

Neighbor-to-PSC pipeline

Story to comment to filed testimony. On the WEPCO 2026 record.

Rate case, GOTV, and voter education travel together. Same doors, same volunteers, same season.

Coalition outreach and the comments campaign

An opportunity for neighbors — paid, structured, on the record.

The comments campaign is where the rate case meets the block. We are building it as a real economic opportunity for people, not volunteer extraction. Paid outreach roles, clear training, honest expectations. Neighbors show up for their neighbors, and their time is respected. What follows names, specifically, what the work looks like.

Who can do it

Lindsay Heights and north-side residents. Must be 18 and up. Teams of three to four per shift for safety and pair-work. No prior experience required — the training is the on-ramp.

What they do, specifically

Door-to-door canvassing. Distribute flyers for Walnut Way and coalition partners. Host and staff advertised walk-in comment tables at YWCA, Parklawn, Walnut Way, and other sites. Help neighbors put a comment on the PSC docket. Wear yellow safety vests. Return tablets at end of shift.

How they are paid

\$20/hour, 18 and up. Minimum 2 hours per week, maximum 15. Training, orientation, and kickoff time is paid. Hours logged weekly to a project lead. Payment on a regular cycle through Walnut Way payroll.

Where the work lands

Filed comments on the WEPCO 2026 rate case docket. Coalition ledger of who was reached, where, and when. Radio amplification through WNOV and 98.3 August through November. The record fills with the voices of the people paying the bills.

Reciprocal community organizing. Real dollars, clear roles, a docket that closes with our neighbors' comments inside it.

What we already have in motion

Rate case, governor's race, and data center accountability rest on four funder relationships and three artifacts already built — the closing arc of what is funded, not new work.

Primary funder — Energy Foundation

Underwrites the community-inside intervention. Pays for the rate case seat at the PSC, the 15-question scorecard, the June 27 forum, coalition delivery, and grantee re-grants. Without this, none of what follows exists.

McKnight

Anchors the community-owned renewable infrastructure lane. MIRACLE community solar, North Division rooftop feasibility, and utility-scale solar work — so the transition off fossil generation gets built and owned on the north side, not just decided in a docket.

HUD — Gwen Moore earmark

Anchors Healthy Homes Level 1 programming. Household-level Healthy Homes delivery in partnership with UW-Milwaukee. Hub coordination through Walnut Way with Elevate — the on-the-ground appliance, weatherization, and indoor air work that the rate case and coalition sit on top of.

CECW partnership

WEBB is the community-inside seat inside CECW. Race to the Top framing means we bring the north-side voice into the coalition's policy, buildings, and data-center work — CUB has the docket, Sierra Club has the legal, we have the community.

Three artifacts already in motion — the closing arc, not new work.

Published scorecard

15 questions. 8 candidates invited. Verbatim answers from 5 responders. Live on walnutway.org for any voter, reporter, or partner to read.

Forum video

The June 27 forum, on the record. Community voice segments alongside moderated Q&A. Posted on walnutway.org as public evidence of the room.

Tracker + commitments

Post-primary follow-up on candidate positions and public commitments — using the same questions candidates already answered. In development.

The point is not to start something new. The point is to close what's in motion and get it into the hands of candidates, grantees, and CC members.
